WATER CONSERVATION SCHEDULE

Tooele City is implementing a water schedule for outdoor water use for all local residences, businesses, schools, and government agencies using culinary water.

In the water conservation schedule, the City is divided into three sections and watering is allowed twice weekly (see adjacent table).

Area #1 All water users North of Vine and West of Main water Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Area #2 All water users North of Vine and East of Main water Tuesdays and Fridays.

Area #3 All water users South of Vine water Mondays and Thursdays.

Outdoor watering is not permitted on Sundays.

The City encourages residents not to water during the hottest hours of the day, typically between 10 am and 6 pm. This conserves water and reduces the amount on your water bills.

If there are special circumstances that require a modified schedule for residents or businesses-such as

newly planted sod or lawn, contact Tooele City at 843-2150.

City parks and schools have been placed on a modified schedule because of the size of their lawn areas. While some parks and school may be watering more than two days each week, a specific area of that park is only watered twice during the week.

TRAINING INSPIRES DEEPER THOUGHT By Kami Perkins, Human Resource Director

Look around many places of business and you'll see the word "integrity" posted on a wall or included in their mission statement. Ironically, many of these businesses have a difficult time articulating what it means to demonstrate integrity or to behave ethically. If you ask a Tooele City employee to explain these to you, however, you are likely to get a more clear answer.

On May 7, employees were required to attend training on ethics and integrity. "What we are trying to do is get employees to think about integrity and workplace ethics on a regular basis. It is easy to put a slogan on the wall but until we are willing to dig deep into the subject, we'll never empower people to think for themselves and understand how to evaluate situations and know what it means to act with integrity," said Kami Perkins, Tooele City Human Resource Director.

Dr. Quinn McKay, who resides in Utah, conducted the training. In his training Dr. McKay emphasized that there are four tools of deception: (1) stating things that are not so – outright lying; (2) overstating or exaggerating a situation or condition; (3) understating circumstances; and (4) withholding information. He also asked employees to acknowledge that a challenge exists between loyalties to others and the need to act with integrity. "Understanding this gives you the ability to think about the situations you may encounter and know in advance how you will act when this situation arises," said Dr. McKay.

Several situations were discussed and provoked much thought and debate. "The fact is, I have never met a dishonest businessman," he stated, "every businessman I've met can justify his actions and in his own mind, he acted appropriately." He challenged each employee to ask himself or herself, "I may have stated the facts, but did I convey a true impression regarding the totality of those facts?"

In his closing statements to the workforce Mayor Patrick Dunlavy encouraged the workforce to give individual thought to the topics covered in the training. "This training was not required because I believe there is a problem within our workforce. To the contrary, we have excellent employees who provide great service to this community. We will do it with integrity and ethics," he stated.

The goal of the training was to increase awareness, generate individual thought, and to hope that employees will act with more integrity, both at work and in their personal lives, than they would have had they not attended the training.

A Child Is Missing Alert Program

Some of you may have been called by an automatic system called A Child Is Missing (ACIM) a couple of weeks ago when some children were missing. ACIM is a national non-profit organization offering free assistance to law enforcement to aid in recovering missing persons (including children, teens, and elderly). ACIM provides immediate telephone alerts to the surrounding community when an individual goes missing. ACIM alerts have led to more than 230 recoveries.

The following steps are taken in using ACIM's Alert Program:

A person calls the police department to report a missing child, elderly or disabled person. The police department then calls A Child Is Missing on a toll-free number.

ACIM takes all pertinent information then makes a



recorded message with the information that has been supplied.

The location last seen is entered into the computer and a database of phone numbers of the residents/businesses is gathered. The message is then sent out to the community.

When a child is reported missing near water, the immediate area is canvassed with the message, then the search area is expanded if the child has not been found.



ACIM continues to work with the officer on the scene and/or the communications department until the missing person has been found.

After recovery, the agency calls ACIM to stop the search.

Tooele County, in conjunction with the Utah Department of Transportation, have initiated an Environmental Assessment for a potential **Midvalley Highway** in Tooele County. The study will document the need for the project, project alternatives and design options, and potential impacts to the natural and built environment.
